#### **EDITORIAL**

When I was a child, I celebrated the feast of the Ascension by imagining Jesus like a space rocket launched into heaven. To this day there is an operative image of Jesus shooting straight up in the air, as if he took one big jump on the trampoline of earth and catapulted into the glory of God.

The Ascension marks the culmination of the Easter message. In his *Letter to the Colossians* Saint Paul writes: "If then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above where Christ is seated at the right hand of God; think of what is above, not of what is on earth" (Col. 3:1-2). The language of "above" and "not what is earthly" has created a consciousness of dualism: heaven and earth; body and spirit; God and world. But the ascension of Christ is not about a heavenly rocket ship launched into heaven, it is about our humanity now permanently inserted into the life of God in and through Jesus Christ. We have become a new creation, and God has become new as well. Heaven is earth's openness to its completion in God.

As Christians, our hope is secure because it rests in Jesus' death and resurrection. Because Jesus has overcome sin forever, we can live in freedom and peace, no matter what situations we may face. We have been reconciled to God. We are no longer strangers. Every day, we can live in confidence, knowing that our God is with us to strengthen and comfort us.

Our hope is also founded in the inheritance Jesus won for us—none other than being with our Father forever, knowing him intimately, in all his splendour and beauty. In his ascension, Jesus has opened the door for us. Though we are sinners, we have been forgiven and redeemed. We are now fully loved and accepted as God's children, and we will live with him forever.

As we live every day in the hope of our eternal inheritance, however, we can begin to taste these blessings here and now. This is part of the "immeasurable greatness of his power in us who believe." Before he returned to his Father, Jesus promised his disciples that anyone who believed in him would be able to cast out demons, heal the sick, and perform signs and wonders in his

name (Mark 16:17-18). How? By the power of the Holy Spirit, who lives inside of us. The same Spirit who raised Jesus from the dead is in our hearts, inviting us to yield to him and empowering us to live in the victory of the resurrection. No challenge is too great for a child of God!

Bernard of Clairvaux spoke of three comings of Christ, the first coming of Christ at his birth, his second coming of at the end of time and a *third* coming of Christ, into our midst, into our hearts, each day. The ascension of Christ is the third coming of Christ; in this Big Bang universe, Christ is always emerging in us as we seek to grow in love. Jesus' ascension into heaven conveys to us a new reality, that our humanity is fulfilled in God, and God is fulfilled in us, as Jesus proclaimed: "I am with you always, until the end of time" (Matt 28:20).

The Ascension celebrates Jesus' ultimate triumph over death and his exaltation to God's right hand. It signifies that Jesus is now fully glorified and reigns in heaven, holding dominion over all creation. This glorious state should inspire Christians to seek heavenly things and live with a sense of purpose and mission, reflecting Christ's love and truth in the world.



#### 8th May 2025 80th Anniversary of VE Day

8th May 2025 marks the 80th anniversary of the end of hostilities in Europe between the Nazi tyranny and the Allied forces.

Newsreels of the time, show huge street parties and crowds dancing in

the streets, even the Princess' Elizabeth (our late Queen) and her sister, Margaret, mingled with crowds, enjoying the moment. This was the time the people of this nation and her allies celebrated the moment the guns fell silent and the lights came back on again.



Every year, in November, the courage and success of the military and civilians like the Merchant Navy are remembered, with special thanks to those who laid down their lives, so we can be free.

However, for many years people of the home front, who kept the country fed, manufactured the equipment we needed to achieve that goal were often overlooked, including the Women's Land Army, the Lumber Jills, the factory workers, Bevan Boys and so many others. The survivors of this terrible time are fewer every year, many of them over 100 years old.

One particular group, whose work remained secret and out of the public domain was the Government Code and Cypher School, Bletchley Park.

Here were upward of 3000 personnel, civilian and military, all sworn to absolute secrecy, not to discuss any of their work with family, friends or work colleagues under any circumstance.

Many of these code breakers were recruited by a novel means thought up by Alan Turing, he devised a crossword competition in a National newspaper, successful entrants were invited to an interview, but told nothing about their work except that was "hush hush and very important".

They were working on deciphering Nazi coded messages. The most famous, being the Enigma codes. This was a machine capable of coding messages as well as decoding them. It was considered to be unbreakable. A team of code breakers, by some of the most brilliant analytical minds headed by Alan Turing, Gordon Welchman, Hugh Alexzander and Stuart Milner-Barry. They succeeded in breaking and deciphering the Nazi naval code used by the Nazi U boat wolf packs that were attacking the transatlantic convoys, with devastating losses of thousands of tons of merchant shipping costing great loss of life of Merchant Navy sailors and causing the loss of vital food and other materials needed for the war effort.

Deciphering these messages enabled the convoys with greater preparedness to avoid the wolf packs and ultimately saved untold numbers of lives and finally defeating the wolf packs. The Enigma codes were deciphered by means of an electro-mechanical machine called a "bombe" designed by Turung and Welchman and their team.

Besides the Naval code, Bletchley Park successfully decrypted the Italian codes, many of the Wehrmacht codes as well as some of the Japanese codes.

In 1943, a brilliant engineer named Tommy Flowers headed up a team which designed and developed an electronic machine named Colossus being the first fully programmable computer, (fully 2 years before the American E.N.I.A.C. which the Americans claimed to be the first computer) Colossus speeded up the decryption of the Enigma code by a huge factor.

Around this time the Nazi high command started using a more complex coding machine the Lorenze and a code known to the British as "Tunny". In conduction with Turing and Flowers, the brilliant mathematician, Bill Tutt deciphered the Tunny code and was able to read Tunny messages within hours using Colossus.

This was used to great effect in the run up to D Day and the liberation of Europe. Britain was able to pass disinformation through it's double agents about troop movements etc. as well as potential landing sites for

the invasion and read the effect these false messages were having on Nazi high command. This, in itself shortened the war considerably and ultimately saved hundreds of thousands of lives.

Churchill said"Bletchley Park was the goose that laid the Golden Eggs"


After the war, Turing, in Civilian Life, worked at Manchester University, and died on 7th June 1954 in mysterious circumstances. On his bedside table was an apple, with a single bite taken from it. This symbol is now used by the Apple corporation and is seen on all it's computers and iphones.

Churchill decreed that all of the Colossus machines and all drawings etc. should be destroyed. It was known that the Soviets had liberated many Lorenze machines and were using them for their own purpose. Presumably Churchill wanted to maintain good relations by not letting any one know that we had broken the Lorenze code. At least one Colossus machine was "squirrelled away," and used to decipher Soviet messages up to the early 60's by GCHQ. This enabled a working replica to be be built which can be seen today at Bletchley Park.

In 1982 Gordon Welchman, published a book, "The Hut Six story" which told the story of Bletchley Park Until then, little if anything was known about what had been going on at Bletchley Park. this did not go down

well with the Bletchley Park veterans who took their vow of secrecy very seriously, some even taking their secrets to the grave.

This book led Welchman into a lot of trouble with the Authorities, causing him to have his security clearances withdrawn. The book was recalled and pulped. (Although the book has since been reprinted).

On 1st April 2025, the death was reported of Betty Webb, aged 101 years one of the last Bletchley Park code breakers, Rest in Peace.

In 2014 a film, "The Imitation Game" starring Benedict Cumberbatch dramatised the work of Turing and his team in Bletchley Park in breaking the Enigma codes and his life after the war, although the film was heavily criticised for it's many inaccuracies.

A hint to the work of the code breakers at Bletchley Park was in the 1964 film "From Russia with Love" when James Bond was tasked with stealing a "Lector" coding and decoding machine from the Russian embassy in Istanbul. The book was written by Ian Fleming, who had worked for a time at Bletchley Park.

Immediately following the fall of France and the rescue of 338,226 soldiers by "the little ships" from Dunkirk in June 1940, there was a real threat that Britain would be invaded within weeks once the RAF was defeated and the Luftwaffe had air superiority over Britain.

Churchill then issued a direct instruction for the formation of a Top Secret organisation, The Auxiliary Units, (the "Scallywags") these did not come into the public eye until the publication of a book in 2007 "The Last Ditch" by David Lampe which explained the reason, role and setup of the Auxiliary Units.

These units were selected from local people (Men & Women) who were not required for services in the Armed Force by reason of Age, Reserved Occupation or other reasons including Medical, and had a good local knowledge of the area, an acceptable reason for being where they were. Again, they were sworn to absolute secrecy. The units were set up as "Patrols" with between four and eight members, patrols did not know where other patrols were nor know the names of the members to preserve security. Service in the Auxiliary Units was expected to be highly dangerous, with a projected life expectancy of just 12 days with orders not to be captured alive.

Although the members of the patrols were issued with Home Guard uniforms, they were complete separate from the Home Guard and answered directly to GHQ Home Forces. The Patrol members were trained

in Special Forces skills at Coleshill Manor, Berkshire, such as Weapon handling, Unarmed Combat, Demolition, Sabotage, Guerrilla warfare and many other skills. Each patrol had an "Operational Base," (OB) well stocked with food weapon and ammunition, separate munition stores, away from the OB's were common and some of the patrols also had Observation Posts connected to the OB by field telephone. These OP's, OB's and Stores were very carefully constructed and camouflaged, with well disguised entrances and often built underground.

In 1941 South Wales Headquarters were at Penllwen Park, Carmarthen and then by 1943 at "The Cawdor" Lammas Street, Carmarthen.

In the event of an invasion, the Regular Army would, with the assistance of the Home Guard try to hold the line, If the Regulars were in danger of being overwhelmed, the Auxiliary units would fall back to their Operational Base and "disappear" for several weeks, the Home Guard wold provide a rearguard action, and surrender if overwhelmed.

The task of the Auxiliary units was, in the event of the invasion, to go into hiding and being behind enemy lines cause as much disruption as possible to the invaders. On 3rd December 1944 when all risk of invasion was over, The Auxiliary Units and Home Guard were stood down.

One such Patrol was set up in Llanfyrnach, with its's Operational Base in the old Silver Lead mine. At Cwm Aur off the road to Llwyn -yr- Hwrdd Chapel.

In the early 1980's, Phillip Johnnnes, Bryn Villa Hermon, was taken by Stanley Davies to the OB in Llanfyrnach Silver-Lead Mines in Cwm Aur. The following day, Phillip went back and was unable to find the entrance!!

## Palak Dal (Lentil and Spinach curry with turmeric, garlic and chilli)

#### **Ingredients**

250gms moong dal (Skinned and split mung beans)
100gms spinach leaves roughly chopped
900mls water
1 tsp turmeric powder
Pinch of asafoetida
3 tbsp vegetable oil or ghee
1 tsp cumin seeds
6 garlic cloves finely chopped
1" ginger finely chopped
2 green chillies finely chopped
Salt to taste
Juice of half lemon

#### Method

- 1. In a heavy bottom sauce pan cook the dal along with the water, turmeric and asafoetida for 25-30 minutes over a medium heat. Cool slightly and mash the dal roughly with a potato masher or back of a large spoon.
- 2. In a large non stick sauce pan heat the oil or ghee over a medium flame. Add the cumin seeds followed by the garlic, ginger and green chilli
- 3. Fry for a few seconds and add the cooked dal along with 150mls of water. Simmer for 2 minutes
- 4. Add the chopped spinach and season to taste. Continue to simmer on a low heat for a further 2 minutes. Stirring to make sure it does not stick to the bottom of the pan
- 5. Add lemon juice and turn the heat off. Serve warm with chapatti or rice.

Note: As it cools the Palak Dal will get thicker so add a little more water if you wish

Revd Shirley Murphy had an amazing time speaking to the Clynderwen and Llandissilio WI on the evening of 7th April about Indian curry and spices.


Revd Shirley was specially requested to wear her Indian Salwar Kameez for the evening.


