

EDITORIAL

Community Spirit, is it still alive and well?

In the last few years, we have witnessed some radical changes and not necessarily for the better. Things which have impacted all our lives have been the Covid pandemic, causing great distress to many, but also showing great community spirit when people came together to make scrubs and other PPE for the Health service. Whether these endeavours were ultimately useful to the intended recipients is a matter for discussion, but it certainly improved the well being of the groups and individuals making the equipment, they felt they were "doing their bit" in a national crisis.

Wars and conflicts have a huge impact on all our lives creating a cost of living crisis that has made difficulties for many people. There are plenty of other examples that could be considered that have a negative impact on mental health.

However, all is not gloom and doom, it is correct to note that for many generations, groups of individuals with common interests have come together to help and support each other, the Gardening club, the Rugby club the Women's Institute, Faith groups and many more are all playing their part to "make life worth living in the places we live and raise our families in and not an adjunct to the real business of the community" (1)

These and other groups still are doing their important work in making our community a better place, especially as work to improve the community environment, formally carried out by local authority, but due to financial constraints have had to pull back on such work. Some of the more tangible work carried out by groups of volunteers includes litter picking, beach cleaning, the beatifying of verges and planters we see in and around our towns and villages as well as maintaining the noticeboards where events are advertised and other furniture such as the benches where we can sit a while and contemplate the beauty of our land.

Our Community Centres, Chapels and Churches all play a very important role in community life bringing people together in activities and events, to exchange news and ideas, contributing to well being and good mental health, however, one institution that for centuries has played a very important role in the social community life is closing in huge numbers... the public house which traditionally has been the hub for celebration, commiseration and socialising.

Social media is playing an important role in keeping groups of individuals informed of events, but is no substitute for face to face interaction with others over a pint or a cuppa. Working from home is more prevalent since the pandemic and can be a cause of loneliness and isolation. Farmers are particularly vulnerable to these issues, hence the need for such organisations as the DPJ Foundation and Tir Dewi.

In answer to the question "Community Spirit, is it still alive and well?" The answer is a resounding Yes, but with a caveat.

We are a disconnected society, divided by age and geography and class and ethnicity and religion. (1) We can heal these divides by compassion, respect and. commitment.

Adam Smith (2) knew that the wealth of community is founded on its moral sentiments, the way people behave toward each other.

Whilst there are a multitude of community based organisations, often brought together by social media groups, these can very exclusive to the members within the group, excluding outsiders or those without access to social media, there is a distinct lack of communication and advertising between the diverse groups, excluding many so event clashes occur, particularly during the village show season. So come along advertise your event in Grapevine!





WI OUTING TO SEE SHIRE HORSES 9th September 2025

Glandwr WI went on an outing to see the Shire Horses owned by Huw Murphy in Eglwyswrw. We were welcomed by Enid Cole who gave us a brief introduction whilst we had tea and coffee. Then we were shown into the stables where shire horses Alfie and Morgana were housed and given a very comprehensive account of the history of the family business and the heritage of their shire horses by Mark Cole. We also watched as Steffan Thomas harnessed Alfie in his full harness which was very smart and quite heavy, but he took it all in his stride and never moved a muscle while this was taking place.

Then how did the connection with the palace come about. The palace advertised that they were looking for a young shire horse that they could train to become a Drum Horse and the owners answered the advertisement. This is a very prestigious position for any horse as they would be taking part in all sorts of events where the bands were required to perform. Camilla came (before she became queen) and chose a young horse called Celt who went to join the stables at the palace. As is the protocol when a drum horse joins the army he is given the title of Major, and although the rider of the horse could be a Sargent the horse outranked him by being a Major so Celt became Major Celt. It is interesting to know that of the eight horses owned by the palace, six of them came from the Welsh stables in Eglwyswrw. What a fantastic record.

Two of the most recent horses to join the army were Major Juno and Major Apollo and they are making a come back to Wales on the 20th and 21st September when the stables are holding a demonstration and concert, this has got to be something to put in your diary. The conclusion of the visit was that it was excellent, and then we all went to the Salutation for a buffet to round the day off nicely. A good time was had by all.

Daniel Blackburn, 1971 - 2025

If you had met Daniel for the first time, you would meet a quietly but well spoken, man. Nothing about Daniel was flash, his appearance, mannerisms, even his car. You could be forgiven for thinking that he was a normal Small holder from west Wales, but Oh! That Hair!! He had a rebellious streak!



That first impression could not be further from the truth.

Daniel was a renowned Scientist with excellent practical skills. When he was at Preselli School, although troubled by Dyslexia his A level exams in the sciences, were way above the standard he needed to gain excellent qualifications from some of the most prestigious universities in the world, including Cambridge, but he was a bit of a rebel, often getting into trouble during protest marches in support of his passions. The environment, conservation, ecology, renewable energy and sustainable transport amongst many other causes close to his heart.

He invented a process that would convert used cooking oil into a bio-fuel which he ran his car on, taking it loaded with this Bio fuel in oil cans in the back of his car, on continental trips, with the ready explanation that it was "cooking oil" did he always pay the fuel duty he should have? You will need to ask him!

He became a director of Green Dragon buses at Bwlch-y-Groes, convincing them that Bio-fuel was the future and arranging for the purchase of a suitable mini bus which he converted to run on Bio Fuel, a truly Green Dragon. This bus ran successfully for many years

He became part of the organising group of the Celtic Blue Rock Festival at Trefawr Farm, with Bill & Eirlys Davies which ran successfully every year from 2005 and attracted over 70,00 people at the final event in 2009.

Truly a rebel, but one with a cause.

He became a powerful political lobbyist ensuring that the correct departments in Westminster and Cardiff became aware of just how strongly south west Wales thought about community transport and renewable energy. In fact, he won numerous awards and journal articles for the new technology he was inventing as well as forging great links with bus providers like Richards Brothers to promote and use non-fossil fuels. His goal was to decarbonise private vehicles and use non fossil fuel here in west Wales and ultimately nationwide.

Daniel was a great advocate for renewable energy in the area and was a great influence on many national consultations on developing community led energy initiatives.

To this end he and his team, was involved in submitting a feasibility study for a range of renewable systems including Hydrogen, Solar Wind and Hydro

As a result of initiative, a presentation was given to to the UK Department for Energy and Climate Change, resulting in a grant of £400,000 being awarded to the Cwm Arian team for a feasibility study for developing a community owned Electric Wind Turbine project. a £1.33 million financial package from the Development Bank of Wales allowed for the purchase of a 700kW Turbine from Germany.

The Turbine was delivered to Trefawr in 2019.

The journey of the turbine components through the narrow roads to Llanfyrnach was a testimony to the skill of the drivers of the huge transporters

Whilst the old school in Hermon was being redeveloped as Canolfan Hermon, Daniel was very involved in a solar support scheme for the project,, which involve a Solar Panel array on the roof of the building and an air source heat pump system which resulted in heating cost being zero and over £2,000 a year in feed in tariff payments a truly first Net Zero achievement.

One of Daniels major achievements was effectually, with others to allow the Welsh Government to be the first in the world to introduce an act (of government) to ensure that all public sector bodies in Wales give full consideration to any action on how it would affect the future generations of Wales

Daniel's action, perseverance and campaigning led to many financial grants and awards to the Team at Cwm Arian of well over £3,000,000 which will benefit the community in the years to come. His persuasive manner made it simple for those in authority to see his vision, he did not argue, he just explained why he was right.

It would be true to comment, that whilst Daniel touched many peoples lives, from the school children that he mentored in some scientific project, to the walker he transported in the "Veggie Bus" back to base, up to the leading politicians in Westminster, all new a little bit about the man, he was such a multi faceted, complex and interesting character that few knew the total package.

Many of his close friends and family said many great things about Daniel at his memorial which makes his loss the sadder. He has left a huge gap in the local community and his like will never be seen again, but his spirit will live on in the legacy he leaves behind. A gentle man, a true Gentleman, but a Warrior for the causes he believed in.

A fitting epitaph could be based on the one for Sir Christopher Wren in St. Pauls Cathedral: "If you wish to see my memorial, look around you"

Their anniversary celebrated with was afternoon tea at the new Caffi Beca and the special cake was cut by Helen Davies, who christened the paper, with Joyce Williams and Mair Davies who have been collecting news from Llanfyrnach and Glandwr since the 1980's.



During the 1990's, Bill Davies, Trefawr, having read a report on life in the area and how wonderful it was for children and adults, but not much for the teenagers, decided to hold a festival on the farm. It was an annual event until 2010 when Cardigan council invited it to the town.

Breakfast Muffins

These are fun to make with the kids and are great for refuelling after a morning workout, or for eating on the go. The banana keeps the muffin moist and adds natural sweetness. Blueberries are great here, but feel free to use other berries if you like.

Ingredients

100g rolled oats

120 g Self Raising Flour

2 tsp baking powder

1 tsp ground mixed spice

1 tsp ground cinnamon

250g Greek Yogurt

10ml whole milk

50g butter, melted

3 large eggs, lightly beaten

2 tbsp Vanilla extract

4 tbsp Granulated Sugar

300 g bananas (3 large) mashed or chopped

For the topping

30g mixed seeds (I used slivered Almonds)

1 tbsp rolled oats

1 tbsp demerara sugar

150g fresh blueberries (not frozen) Topping

Method:

Heat the oven 180C fan / gas 6. Line a muffin tray with muffin cases.

Blend the oats in a food processor to the consistency of flour. Add all the remaining ingredients except the banana and blend until smooth.


Transfer the mixture to a large bowl and fold through the bananas and blueberries. Spoon the mixture evenly into the muffin cases.

For the topping:

Divide the blueberries between the muffins and mix the almonds, oats and sugar together and sprinkle over the tops of the muffins.

Bake for 35 to 40 mins or until risen, golden and cooked through. Transfer to a wire rack and leave to cool a little. East while still warm if you can. Stays fresh for 3 days.

To freeze: Leave to cool then freeze in Ziplock bags or an airtight container. Defrost at room temperature anytime you need a quick breakfast or treat. You can also reheat the muffins in the oven - heat to 180 deg for 4 to 5 mins.
